


## Liverpool Hope student blogs

## Dead Sea Scroll fragments reveal text



New research has revealed that four Dead Sea Scroll manuscript fragments housed at The University of Manchester's John Rylands Library, which were previously thought to be blank, do in fact contain text. The discovery means that The University of Manchester is the only institution in the UK to possess authenticated textual fragments of the Dead Sea Scrolls.

Fifty one fragments were imaged front and back. Six were identified for further detailed investigation - of these, it was established that four have readable Hebrew/Aramaic text written in carbon-based ink. The study has also revealed ruled lines and small vestiges of letters on other fragments.

## Training & Development Programme

The last part of the NoWAL T&D Programme for 2019-2020 was impacted by the covid-19 lockdown. Of the 17 remaining events, 12 were postponed as many of the hosts were in the process of acclimatising to a new way of working (online and from home).

It was agreed that the other 5 would be delivered online - the programme of online events was as follows:

- **Special Collections** hosted by Lancaster University on 19<sup>th</sup> May and focusing on digital collections
- **Plan S Online Community Discussion** hosted by the NoWAL Research and NoWAL Procurement Groups on 20<sup>th</sup> May
- **Sustainability in Libraries** hosted by Liverpool Hope University on 12<sup>th</sup> June
- **Research Support in Libraries** hosted by the NoWAL Research Group on 9<sup>th</sup> July 2020
- **Library Administrators** hosted by Lancaster University on 15<sup>th</sup> July 2020

Feedback from all the events was really positive with participants clearly benefitting from the opportunity to get together online without the time and inconvenience of travelling to and from host institutions.

The programme for the next academic year will be delivered solely online, for the first semester at least, after which time, it will be reviewed and decisions made in line with the advice around travel, entry onto campuses etc. However, the intention is to offer a hybrid programme from now on, with a combination of online and face to face events being a feature of all our programmes.

We are currently looking to draw a programme together for 2020-2021 and have asked our members to suggest ideas and topics for future events.

## Celebrating Successes

**University of Manchester** library's Neil Sprunt, a Teaching and Learning Librarian, has been awarded the University's Distinguished Achievement Medal for his role as copyright expert within the University. Neil has built up a very successful University-wide copyright advice service over the last few years.

**UCLan's** LIS has won the Golden Rose Award for University Service of the Year, organised by the Student's Union. It was in particular recognition of the support all areas of the service had provided in moving into lockdown.

**Royal Northern College of Music** Library was rated as excellent or good by 98% of respondents in its annual Library survey.

**Liverpool John Moores University** Two members of library staff were nominated in the JMSU Amazing Teacher Awards & Val Stevenson won the President's award for work on diversification of library collections and the implementation of the Rosetta Stone language online learning platform.

Topics included managing your references using Endnote; researching commercial companies for applications and interviews; finding reliable health information and getting started with your systematic review. The webinars were hosted on Microsoft Teams and booked through Eventbrite. They were very well received and the library plans to continue the series over the summer with a focus on PGR students. All webinars along with bite sized how-to videos have been uploaded to the Library Skills Microsoft Stream channel.


